
DEDICATION DAY OCTOBER 11

At two-thirty on Sunday, October 11, our school will be dedicated. Thinking back for a moment, one would remember 1957 when we were a student body of six hundred, utilizing twelve teachers at the old Annex of Santa Clara High. Today, the student enrollment is nearing sixteen hundred while the faculty numbers sixty-three; and best of all, we have out own magnificent school, which all of us are duly proud of.

Everyone is heartily welcomed to the dedication, and the open-house program which will follow immediately after. The dedication ceremony will take place on the stage of the inner quad, while the formal dedication of the plaque is scheduled for the area around the flagpole in front of the school. During the open house the teachers will be available in their rooms while tours will be offered by student guides.

Included in the dedication program are numbers by the Buchser High band and choir, directed by Mr. Melvin Di-Salvo. Some of the speakers on the agenda include the following: Emil R. Buchser, superintendent of the Santa Clara School District; Clyde Spencer, president of Buchser High Student Body; and Joseph Rebeiro, mayor of Santa Clara. A high point of this ceremony will be Mr. Buchser's presenting Mr. Herbert Stocking, Buchser High principal, with the keys to the school.



SUCCESS STORY

Next Sunday our beautiful school will be dedicated. This is the story of the man for whom it has been named.

Mr. Emil R. Buchser began his career in the educational field as a teacher in 1920. He then became principal of an elementary school, and from there he became principal of the Santa Clara High School in 1938. He was made superintendent of schools of the Santa Clara Elementary District as well as the Santa Clara High School District in 1940. He has served in this capacity for almost 20 years and has saved the district several million dollars during this time because of his farsighted-

FIRE STRIKES **BUCHSER HIGH**

During the first period, September 23, a fire of unknown origin did minor damage to the boys' rest room in the F wing. Most of the damage that occurred was smoke damage and will require cleaning and painting. Because of the immediate response by our Santa Clara City Fire Department, further damage was averted.

Mr. Stocking, principal, said, "I want to thank the student body of Buchser High School for their conduct during this emergency and assure all that we are moving forward immediately to repair the damage."

An investigation to determine the actual cause of the fire was conducted.

During his career he has also been active in the recreation field, the Rotary Club, the Santa Clara Symphony Association, and many other civic affairs. He has spent most of his life working for the betterment of education in the Santa Clara School District. and it is altogether fitting and proper that our school be named for so great a man as Emil R. Buchser.

FOUR ATTEND CONFERENCE

Four students from Buchser attended an eight-hour youth conference sponsored by the Santa Clara County Citizens Committee on Children and Youth on Saturday, September 26. Representing Buchser at the conference were Clyde Spencer, student body president: Elaine Deckard, editor of the yearbook; Sherry Brooks, editor of the Bear Prints: and Jim Knabke president of Key Club. The conference was held at San Jose State College. Representatives of all the other high schools in Santa Clara County and about seven hundred adults were also in attendance. Such topics as juvenile delinquency, influence of homelife, importance of education, and vocational guidance were discused, and suggestions for remedial action will be made to the governor. A full report on this conference and its results will be presented to the student body sometime next March.

Buchser needs your support; your class needs your support; so if you haven't purchased a student body card yet, GET IT NOW!

Your purchase of a student body card may mean \$100 for your class. If 75% of the students at Buchser do not purchase cards, the \$100 for a class prize will not be given. So get out and support your class and school by buying a student body card.

THE BIG SWITCH

Tuesday, September 29, was the date of the "Big Switch." Many students were transferred from a majority of their classes; others weren't transferred at all.

Many Buchserites have wondered what circumstances prompted this switch. As we are all aware, Buchser has many, many more students than had been planned for. These first few weeks found many classes over-crowded. The enrollment at Buchser will continue to increase from now until approximately the end of the first semester when enrollment should be at its peak. In anticipation of the future growth, the administration had to make adjustments. and so three new teachers were hired. This increase in faculty naturally affected many classes. Fifteen new sections were opened: English I, English 2, English 3, English 4, senior problems, United States history, world history, two classes of general math, plane geometry, Algebra II, chemistry, Typing I, mechanical drawing, and Basic Electricity I.

Mr. Franusich wishes to announce also that this year there will be a new policy concerning freshmen taking Algebra I. All freshmen students receiving an "F" the first six weeks grading period will automatically be put into general math.

There are many reasons for this policy, but one that may be of interest is this: students having trouble in the first couple of weeks usually find it difficult to pull their grades up. If they miss a whole semester, it is much harder to make up the work in the new class.

BUCHSER'S NEW STUDENT STORE

Mr. McGinness who is directly in charge of running the student store explains that there are two purposes for having it. The profit goes to the A.S.B. to help with expenses; and more important, it is used to train students in handling and operating the cash register, selling, stocking, taking inventory, and ordering. The office practice students also work during their study hall and their secretarial pool when they type, mimeograph, and run off ditto masters. They also learn to file and record. All students receive 1/2 credit.


MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL


